

### South Cliff Villages Group NOT FROM THE RECTORY



Oh, Mr Porter, what shall I do? I want to go to Birmingham but here I am at Crewe!

The government's advice has until recently been not to travel by train unless absolutely necessary but happily it is now relaxing and allowing for a resumption of leisure travel such as we enjoyed last autumn when we were booked to go from Grantham to Knaresborough via Leeds but due to the cancellation of the Leeds train were diverted via York so nothing as disastrous as Marie Lloyd had to deal with. The onward train headed north out of York but very soon left the East Coast main line and took the scenic route to Leeds via Harrogate passing in the process the site of the Civil War battle of 1644 at Marston Moor complete with its Grade 11 listed signal box of 1910 which controls the Marston Lane level crossing.

Knaresborough with its ruined castle sits above the River Nidd and the valley is crossed by the Victorian railway bridge which forms a grand back drop for any photograph. There is a pleasant river side walk and in the sunshine of a warm autumn day the opportunity was taken to stroll along with an ice cream in hand.

With any impurities of the body washed away, what better way to celebrate than with lunch at Betty's and a 'Fat Rascal' to take back for tea time!

A walk in the Valley Gardens beckoned with the trees looking their autumnal best on a glorious day of a 'Little St Luke's Summer'.

So much for the Bridge and the Bath but what about the Bear? Well we are talking serious bear sized teddy which we had seen sat in the window of the Martin House [children's hospice at Boston Spa] charity shop in the Market Square at Knaresborough. He – William – was still there the next day so in we went and rescued him, and then had the task of bringing him home while explaining to the ticket inspector that no we didn't have a ticket for the young man even though he was hoping for his own seat on the return train!

The Archdeacon would have been pleased to note the church newsletter is called 'Bridges' and features the railway bridge over the River Nidd: the church's business is so often about making bridges to connect or perhaps to re-connect people and communities. In a homily delivered at the Peterborough diocesan choir festival the Reverend Richard Coles recalled his childhood years as a boy chorister before he drifted away from the church. Many years later however he found himself sat in St Mary's episcopal cathedral in Edinburgh for a service of Choral Evensong and it was hearing the familiar music and the familiar chants that provided him with the 'bridge' he needed to cross to return to the Church of England and to the ministry for which today he is well known on both TV and Radio.



#### **BARKSTON AND SYSTON PARISH COUNCIL**

A Meeting of the Parish Council was held on 9<sup>th</sup> March. All members of the Parish Council were present, together with Councillor Ray Wootten (County Council). District Councillors Mrs Rosemary Kaberry-Brown and Ian Stokes sent apologies. There were no members of the public present.

The Clerk, as usual, updated members on the progress with various matters in connection with roads and footpaths, which had been raised at previous meetings. In particular, it was noted that action had been taken to clear the blocked drain causing flooding near The Stag. The Minnetts Hill/Church Street area was, however, still a problem, and a reminder is to be sent for more work at that location.

Councillor Steve Elnor reported a notification from the County Council that they were exploring the provision of a bridle bridge over the River Witham near the stepping stones. He said that there were dangers involved with horses crossing the railway line, and would be in discussion with the Council over this. The County had advised that they were not intending to remove the stepping stones, rather to supplement them with the bridge for the benefit of riders. Formal consultation would take place should the proposals proceed.

Car parking at the end of West Street was a concern, causing a hazard and damage to the verges.

An update in regard to the Community Speedwatch scheme was given – the passive signs had been put up at various points on the A607 through the village, training for some volunteers had taken place, and the equipment necessary (speed guns, signs, hi-viz jackets and a traffic counter) had been purchased. In regard to a query from a local resident, the Council confirmed that they had had all relevant facts to hand before making a decision on the scheme to be used. There was a commitment by the Police to give attention to speeding through the village, within available staffing resources.

In regard to the parking issues on Church Street, mainly at school times, it was noted that following checks by the Police and civil enforcement officers, it had been established that there was minimal parking on the double yellow lines, although there was still some parking on the bus stop opposite the school, and on the stop near The Stag. This was confirmed by several Councillors. It had been suggested that one stop in each direction could be removed (those mentioned above), which would have the effect of removing the parking problem. However, the Council considered that the stops had been located where they were currently for the benefit of various parts of the

The 2020 season is fast becoming a season that never was, with no games, no junior practice and no money.

The disappointing part was the reaction from the village and local business, even with an internet media campaign on facebook, twitter and the Barkston Village page.

The club tries to keep playing costs to a level that everyone can afford so most of our income comes from Junior cricket (we only receive £5 per child for all stars from ECB), drinks and food sales after training sessions and sponsorship, so our income this year has been nothing.

Hopefully on to better times next season when the current one has expired. We are at the moment working on new sponsorship packages for the 2021 season. If any local business or person would like more information please contact me.

Barkston and Syston Parish Council continued.

Comments have continued to be made in response to planning consultations from SKDC. The Parish Council have finally taken ownership of the picnic area on Station Road, and arrangements are in hand for its refurbishment. A quotation for the cutting of the Burial Ground hedge has been accepted.

Again, as a result of the coronavirus crisis, commencement of the Community Speedwatch scheme was halted. Since then, the trainer has left the Road Safety Partnership and has not so far been replaced. This has unfortunately meant that although the scheme could otherwise proceed with appropriate safeguarding, it cannot because there are insufficient trained volunteers. The Clerk to our partner authority, Belton & Manthorpe Parish Council, is currently liaising with the Road Safety Partnership and parishioners will be kept informed.

A recent response has been received from LCC in regard to the issue of parking on bus stops, following the Parish Council's agreement in March that the four stops in Church Street should remain. The County Council supported the Parish Council's decision and had agreed to provide appropriate road markings and signage in an attempt to prevent parking on the stops, which was illegal. This action would, it was hoped, assist in enforcement of the regulations.

The next meeting is scheduled for 14<sup>th</sup> September, although it has not yet been decided whether this will be a meeting in person, or 'virtual'.

village. It was agreed to object to the removal of any of the stops.

The trees to fill in the gaps in the Burial Ground hedge were expected shortly, and the Clerk was asked to remind the Commonwealth War Graves Commission that the ordered sign had not yet been received.

In regard to the picnic area, the Clerk said that he had now heard from the County Council that the formalities in connection with the transfer of the land to the Parish Council were nearly complete. It was agreed that when the transfer deed was ready, the Chair and Vice-Chairman be authorised to execute it.

The Council discussed reports of fly tipping and dumping in the area. Several incidents had been reported to SKDC, and after discussion it was agreed that the Clerk would contact the appropriate Portfolio Holder at SKDC to request that further action was required, including an extension to the opening hours of the civic amenity site at Alexandra Road, Grantham. It was also agreed to contact the Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils to request that publicity be given to this issue, with the idea of a more unified response to a county wide problem.

The next meeting is on MONDAY 11<sup>th</sup> MAY 2020 at 7.45 pm at the VILLAGE HALL. This will be the Annual Meeting of the Council, and will be preceded by the Annual Parish Meeting.

Barkston and Syston Parish Council update.

The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council scheduled for the 11<sup>th</sup> May did not take place owing to restrictions on meetings being held in person imposed by the Coronavirus Act. This meeting would normally elect the Chair and Vice-Chair for the ensuing year, but the above Act extended the appointments until May 2021.

A 'virtual' meeting of the Parish Council was held on 6<sup>th</sup> July, via 'Zoom', to consider the financial update and matters connected to the Annual Audit for the year 2019/20. Seven of the nine Councillors attended but unfortunate technical difficulties prevented two Councillors being present, and apologies were accepted. Following consideration, the Council agreed to certify as an exempt authority and agreed the annual governance statement and accounting statements for 2019/20. Since the last meeting in March, there has not, unfortunately, been any significant response in regard to matters raised about highways, although various small items raised have been dealt with under a new scheme of proactive response.
