NOT FROM THE RECTORY



I've recently enjoyed reading 'The Shepherd's Life' by James Rebanks. It's an enthralling, and down-to-earth account of a Lake District shepherd's year, and since being published just over a year ago has become something of a sensation, remaining on the best-seller lists for weeks on end. It made me think how far removed a real shepherd is from the image many of us have. And that's particularly true, I think, of those of us who are familiar with all those references to Jesus as 'The Good Shepherd' we find in the Gospels.

In the far-off days when I went to Sunday School we had a picture on the wall of 'The Good Shepherd'. It showed Jesus with long silky hair and wearing a spotless white robe with a lovely blue sash. He looked very holy, and light years away from what a real Palestinian shepherd would have been like. They were a rough, tough bunch – men who lived pretty much outside normal society, sometimes spending weeks on end with their flocks. They wouldn't have been very clean, and probably wouldn't have smelt nice either.

What a good shepherd did have though, was fearless devotion to his flock, often risking his life to protect them from bandits and wild animals. What particularly characterised him was the way he knew every sheep individually – not just what they looked like, but the sound of their voice and their mannerisms. He'd give them names like black ear, smutty nose, waggy tail, and they'd be with him for years, because these sheep were not kept mainly for meat, as ours are, but for their wool, so they could live to a ripe old age. Every single one counted with him, and if any got into trouble, he would soon notice and go to their aid.

You can see why it's an image Jesus chose for himself, and how it can be an inspiration for those of us who try to follow him and put his teaching into practice. Everyone has a need to be recognised, to be called by name, to be listened to, to feel they count. And I think that's especially so in our fast-moving and increasingly impersonal age, where everything is so success-oriented. Taking the lead from Jesus, we can be people who really notice and value others, who give them time and are prepared to go the extra mile, particularly for those who have lost their way or who feel forgotten or written off.

Jesus, in all he said and did, shows us a God who loves and cares for us all, irrespective of whether we deserve it or not. In fact, he tells us, in the parable of the lost sheep, that there is more joy in heaven over one repentant sinner than over all the so-called righteous put together. Which can be a very hard thing to accept if you identity with the righteous, but is wonderfully encouraging for those of us who count ourselves among the sinners.

BARKSTON AND SYSTON PARISH COUNCIL

A Meeting of the Parish Council was held on Monday 11th July 2016. 8 members of the Parish Council were present, together with District Councillor Ian Stokes. One member of the public attended.

Many highways matters were discussed, and the Council received an update from the Area Surveyor in relation to matters which had been referred. The hole at the frontage of the garage, which had been there for some time, was to be considered for infilling, pending the completion of a scheme to improve drainage in the area.

Church Street and Honington Road had been patched, and there was some improvement in the condition of the surface, but the Clerk was asked to refer the poor state of the road to the Area Surveyor.

There had been a request for road edge markers (stones) around the grassed area at the entrance to St Nicholas Close. However, this could not be acceded to, but the Area Surveyor was looking into the provision of decorative highways approved plastic marker posts.

The accessibility of parts of the villages by wheelchair or mobility scooter had been referred to the Area Surveyor for consideration of the legal requirement of such provision, but this was still being researched.

Another issue referred to the Area Surveyor was the encroachment of the hole in front of the Almshouses into the road, which the Clerk was asked to refer to the Area Surveyor.

A letter from a local resident about weeds at the side of and on pavements was referred to the Area Surveyor.

The Council were advised that the highway grass cutting agreement would terminate at the end of March 2017. Costs of the current agreement were given, together with the cost of cutting the village amenity grass (Village Green, War Memorial, Burial Ground and children's play area), and it was agreed to consider this contract at the budget meeting in January 2017.

LETTER FROM THE BISHOP

'This is true religion,' says the apostle James, 'to care for orphans and widows in their distress, and to keep oneself unstained by the world'.

'Little children,' says the apostle John, 'let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action'.

It is one of those falsehoods that the secular world loves, particularly when horrific atrocities occur, as at the beginning of the summer, with the murder of the French priest Fr Jacques Hamel; religion is bad, the world would be better off without it. Yet the real truth we need to hold on to and live out so that people can see, is that people of faith, real faith, the kind that God approves of, are intended always to be part of the solution, not part of the problem.

The Mission Statement of the Church I led in Cromer ended with we exist... 'for the good of the world'. It is one of the reasons here in the Diocese of Lincoln we have our 'Social Justice Fund', so that we can look for the difference we can make in the communities we are here to serve, and have the means, when they are needed, to make our plans and dreams a reality.

It is one of the fundamental mission questions each church, each mission community, has to face; if we didn't exist, if we weren't here, would it make a difference to the communities we are to serve? If we shut the doors tomorrow would anybody notice, apart from those who faithfully attend?

True faith, true religion is world affirming, seeks to make a difference – loves God, loves people, loves this world we've been given to enjoy. It is, to paraphrase a phrase recently used by President Obama, to believe in the 'audacity of love'. That is the calling of people of faith. The challenge is whether that is what people see and experience in both you and in me.
