

NOT FROM THE RECTORY



Dear Friends.

I wonder if you find, as I do, that the last few weeks before Christmas always fly past far too quickly. It's partly because there is so much going on. Once we're into December, the annual round of carol concerts, nativity plays and Christmas parties begins, and although it can be exhausting, it's also the most enjoyable and rewarding time of year. No matter how many times you've sung the traditional carols or heard the familiar lines in the nativity plays, the power of the Christmas story to surprise and touch us never fades. I particular cherish some of the impromptu add-ons you sometimes get. I remember one nursery school nativity play where alongside the angels in their white dresses and tinsel haloes, there also appeared a giant panda and an angel with Minnie-mouse ears. I remember too a crib service where one little boy would have been heartbroken had he not been allowed to place his dinosaur among the other animals when we made up the crib. And although traditionalists may disapprove, we should remember that people have always taken liberties with the nativity story. What we think of as some of its traditional components, certainly do not appear in the gospel accounts. For almost as long as this story has been told, people have been engaging with it imaginatively and adding extra bits: an ox and ass, for instance; an innkeeper, often with a bad tempered wife; and as for the wise men, well despite the fact that we know next to nothing about them – not even how many there were – we've turned them into three kings and have even given them names. And then there's Mary. She's invariably wearing a pristine blue dress, but that would have been far beyond the means of a simple village girl. In fact, it's said that the blue dress was an invention of medieval artists – because blue was the rarest and most expensive of the pigments used to dve cloth, the artists put Mary in blue as a way of honouring her as the mother of Christ.

And I don't think it really matters. In fact, isn't it proof of the power of this story, how it can draw people in so that they make it their own and re-tell it in ways that are meaningful to them? And if our imaginations do run a bit riot, well isn't that how it should be, because we're not just talking about what happened at Bethlehem 2000 years ago, we're celebrating what Jesus' coming among us means to us now. For Christians, that's what is at the heart of the festivities; it's what brings Christmas alive and makes it so joyful.

There's a lovely old carol, *Cradled in a manger meanly*. We don't sing it much these days, but it speaks of Christ coming, not just a long time ago in a place far away, but into our lives today. It includes these words: 'Lord, will you stoop even lower than that poor stable, and come and be born in me? Will you come O Christ most holy, and make a Christmas in my heart'? It's when Christmas comes in that sense that we are able to enter fully into the joy of the coming festive season.

May the nativity story come alive for you this Christmas, and after all the busyness, may you know the peace and joy the Christ child brings.

Barkston and Syston Parish Council

A Meeting of the Parish Council was held on Monday 14th September 2015. All members of the Parish Council were present, together with District Councillor Ian Stokes and, and County Councillor Ray Wootten.

Prior to commencing the formal business of the meeting, the Council received a presentation from Chris Townson in regard to the Barkston LIVES group. The Group had been active in the last year, attending many call-outs and providing a useful local backup to the ambulance service. (See separate report from LIVES for detail).

Two members of the public attended and spoke during the public forum. They raised issues in relation to the proposed waiting restrictions on Church Street/Honington Road, pointing out that implementation of the proposals would, in their opinion, only push the problem further along Church Street to the benefit only of the buses. The Chairman explained that the points made would be discussed and taken into account during the discussion later in the meeting.

The Council considered the proposed waiting restrictions, and took into account the comments made during the public forum, as well as an email from the Area Surveyor explaining that it was proposed to reconsult on the proposals, following the comments which had been received.

Comments had been received from the Area Surveyor about the other highways issues raised. Most of the issues raised were in the process of being investigated prior to action, and the Parish Council would be kept informed. A meeting to discuss prioritisation of highways issues, which had been deferred for the attendance of the Area Surveyor at a future meeting, was agreed for the 9th November. Action was requested to clean and jet gullies on Minnetts Hill to hopefully prevent spoil and debris washing onto the road and blocking the gullies. It was noted that local volunteer labour had removed four barrow loads of spoil following rains last week.

LIVES members are trained to deal with many life threatening conditions. The team is equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen, pulse oximeter and much more. LIVES (Lincolnshire Integrated Emergency Services) work with the ambulance services. When on duty, we can expect to be with the patient within 4 minutes in our operating area - the 2 mile radius of Barkston & Syston (although we may be called a little further afield.) As a member of the team, you work as often as you are able to, within a time to suit you. Currently our group consists of 4 qualified members + one co-ordinator.

We do need more people to join us, so we can provide more cover – WHY NOT DO YOUR BIT FOR THE COMMUNITY AND HELP TO KEEP PEOPLE ALIVE? Full training and uniform is included.
